It is to the advantage of the listener that for the first time most of the selections within this LP have finally been reproduced on a quality recording. With the exception of Happy-Go-Lucky-Local and Diminuendo in Blue, the balance of the selections are little known but significant compositions rarely heard in Ellington repertoire in the last few years.

When listening to this LP, the following titles will probably offer the most rewarding pleasure to the novice and experienced student of Ellingtonia. Blue Skies, later entitled Trumpets No End, showcases Cat Anderson in one of his earliest Ellington recording sessions, replacing Rex Stewart who soloed the original title. Shelton Hemphill takes the lead, Harold "Shorty" Baker, Francis Williams, Taft Jordan, Ray SBBH 2.000



Nance and Anderson take the solos. Happy-Go-Lucky is an example of Ellington genius later copied as Night Train, the latter becoming a rock 'n roll hit of the late '50's, Magenta Haze and Sultry Sunset, little known as they are, will relax the listener to a jelly-like. mass beholding the talents of Hodges, Carney, Procope, and Hamilton. As always, the punctuations of the piano player flavor the feast for Ellington gourmets.

In retrospect, we find Ellington ahead of others of this period of time with The Beautiful Indians -Hiawatha and Minnehaha - the latter part highlighted by a lilting vocal solo by Kay Davis that would put Yma Sumac to shame.

Golden Feather features the timeless artistry of Harry Carney, the senior member of the Ellington oganization on baritone sax.

What is to be said of a man and an organization who has recorded music for the world for nearly 50 years?! Do what millions of people have done since Duke Ellington came on the scene . . . sit back and put the needle in the groove and enjoy.
