British composer/arranger/reedman/bandleader John Dankworth's long and warm association with Edward Kennedy Ellington began in 1959 in of all places Lambertville, New Jersey. A local promoter hit on the idea of presenting two of the most popular bands of the day (one American and one English) so a double bill was created featuring the then six year old *Johnny Dankworth Big Band* and the Duke's phenomenal late fifties outfit including Clark Terry, Cootie Williams, Jimmy Hamilton, Paul Gonsalves and Harry Carney. Thereafter when either of these two bandleaders visited each others home territory they always 'touched base' and

caught up on current news and usually played a date or two together. It's fitting that this recording features some of John's favorite Ellington selections in new arrangements specially created for symphony orchestra (which the Duke greatly admired as so many of his later works were scored for big band and orchestra). Joining John and the other guest soloists on this live digital outing is Ellington alumnus Barry Lee Hall who not only worked with the Duke but now plays regularly with the group currently led by Mercer Ellington.
