
The name of Billy Strayhorn is familiar to most musicians

and jazz cognoscenti as "Ellington's alter ego" and as the composer of "Lush Life." I first became aware of the extraordinary range of Strayhorn's own output in the late 1970's while performing and hanging out at Bradley's, a jazz club in New York City's Greenwich Village. There I met pianists Jimmy Rowles and Tommy Flanagan and I first heard (and learned to play) "Pretty Girl," "U.M.M.G." and "Lotus Blossom."

In comparison to the celebrated Ellington, Strayhorn is relatively unknown, but his impact on the Duke's songbook was incalculable, including the composition of the two tunes most associated with the Ellington Orchestra, "Take the 'A' Train" and "Satin Doll." Through conversations with Strayhorn's biographer, David Hajdu, I began to understand Strayhorn's life and music apart from his association with Ellington; he gave me generous access to a trove of obscure Strayhorn pieces that further piqued my interest and heightened my admiration.

Though I have included some of his better-known tunes, those listeners expecting literal performances of Strayhorn here may be disappointed. This is a highly personal selection of compositions that have creatively inspired me as a pianist, interpreter and arranger. In the instances where I have taken unconventional approaches to the material, it is my hope that Strayhorn's spirit is still present. In the manner that Billy Strayhorn dedicated many of his songs to exotic flowers, I dedicate this musical flower to him, with love.
